SPRING DIET OF THE BARN OWL IN NORTH MISSISSIPPI

Aspects of the diet of the Barn Owl (*Tyto alba*) have been described by many authors in studies throughout North America. However, most of these studies have been based on remains at a single nest-site or roost. This is especially true of studies done in the southeastern U.S. Notable exceptions include Jemison and Chabreck (1962) on winter Barn Owl prey in coastal Louisiana and several studies in Texas (e.g., Otteni et al. 1972 on year-round Barn Owl diets). In Mississippi, Burchfield (1984) examined the prey at one Oktibbeha County nest.

As part of an investigation on spring habitat and prey use by Barn Owls, I monitored and collected prey remains from 93 sites in Mississippi from March-June 1992. These sites were located in Leflore, Sunflower, and Bolivar counties in the Mississippi Delta and Noxubee, Clay, and Oktibbeha counties in the Black Prairie. Of these 93 sites, prey remains from 13 Delta and 20 Black Prairie sites were included in the following assessment of Barn Owl diets. Prey from the remaining sites were excluded due to small sample sizes or situations that might cause a bias toward the collection of only large prey remains. These scenarios included sites where pellets and other debris accumulated in tall grass, water, or on grating.

Mammalian prey remains were identified to Genus using identified skulls and skull keys by Glass (1973) and Hall and Kelson (1959). Avian remains were identified to species when possible by comparing remains to skeletons and study skins in the ornithological collections at Mississippi State University. Invertebrates were identified to Order.

Sites were cleared of old debris prior to the study, and all of these pellets represented prey captured from March to early June 1992.

RESULTS

Prey from the 13 Delta sites totalled 1223 items and prey from the 20 Black Prairie sites totalled 1611 items for a combined total of 2834 identified prey items (Table 1). Unusual prey items found outside of the March to June 1992 study period or at excluded sites are also listed in Table 1 and are designated by "b."

All of the rabbits identified as prey were juveniles.

DISCUSSION

Suggested dietary differences between the study regions are negligible with respect to the roles of prey groups (rodents, insectivores, birds). However, there seem to be significant differences between regions in the nature of the rodent prey. In the Black Prairie, cotton rats (*Sigmodon hispidus*) accounted for 52% of the individual prey items and about 75% of the biomass. This may reflect relative availability of cotton rats, or it could represent a selection by Barn Owls on this large (120-150 g), prey in a region where many species are abundant.

Delta Barn Owls showed more diversity in their rodent consumption with no single prey species standing out as either crucial or preferred. This situation may represent an abundance of prey where many species are common, or it may represent a prey shortage which requires the capture of anything available. Habitat conditions suggest the latter.

The Black Prairie has a lesser abundance of crop lands that support small rodent prey. However, the interspersed pastures, fallow fields, and moderate timber stands may provide a buffer to sustain winter rodent populations when crop lands are bare. The Delta is a region of abundant food for Barn Owl prey from late spring to fall, but the harvests leave only bare fields and levees to

support winter and early spring rodent populations. This cycle of abundant food to barren fields probably plays a major role in keeping most rodent populations in check. This is especially true for the cotton rat.

Cotton rats are almost exclusively herbivorous and require a year-round supply of seed and other plant materials that are not available in the Delta. The only large prey animal consistently found in Delta samples was the rice rat (*Oryzomys palustris*). This species is nearly omnivorous, feeding on grains, snails, insects, and crustaceans. This diet flexibility would allow for larger rice rat populations to survive the Delta winter.

The burrowing habits of the pine vole (*Microtus pinetorum*) help top explain the presence of this species which contributed the most biomass (about 33%) to Delta Barn Owl diets.

Unusual prey items were all avian and included three Common Flickers (Colaptes auratus), two American Kestrels (Falco sparverius), one Sora (Porzana carolina), one Common Snipe (Gallinago gallinago), one chicken poult (Gallus domesticus), and one unidentified galliform. From examination of thousands of Barn Owl pellets from Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee, the poult and Common Snipe included here are the only domestic or game species that I have found.

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A NOTE ON THE STATUS OF THE BROWN PELICAN IN MISSISSIPPI

In the 1940s a flock of "100 or more" Brown Pelicans (*Pelecanus occidentalis*) was seen on the Mississippi Coast in August (Burleigh 1944). In the next decade, a decline was noticed and recorded (Turcotte 1965) and 10 years later the species had virtually disappeared (Williams and Martin 1968). On 13 October 1970, the species was placed on the U.S. Endangered Species list for the following reasons: (1) accumulation of chlorinated hydrocarbons in the egg; declining food supply, and (3) human disturbance of nesting colonies (Woodard 1980). These problems began to clear up when in the late 1960s DDT-laden pesticides were banned in the U.S. (Edgerton 1992), and when the food supply improved as populations of juvenile menhaden reached highs in 1974 and 1980 (unpublished data, GCRL).

This year (1994) the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources reports (personal communication) that the Brown Pelican is no longer on the Federal Endangered Species list, but is still on the state list as there is no known nesting in Mississippi at this time. The nearest known nesting is in Mobile Bay, Alabama, 15-20 miles to the east. Recently Jackson (1983) and Toups and Jackson (1987) mentioned increasing numbers of these birds on the Mississippi Gulf coast. A recent television commercial sponsored by International Paper Company mentions a comeback of the Brown Pelican in this area. On 19 July 1994, I observed a flock of 72 young Brown Pelicans land on Marsh Point in Ocean Springs, Jackson County, Mississippi. I have lived on the Mississippi Coast for 35 years and this is the largest flock of Brown Pelicans I have seen here.

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BROWN PELICAN AT OKATIBBEE LAKE, LAUDERDALE COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

An adult Brown Pelican (*Pelecanus occidentalis*) in summer plumage appeared at Okatibbee Lake, Lauderdale County, Mississippi, on 30 June 1994, two days prior to a hurricane warning being given for an area from Gulfport, Mississippi to Cedar Key, Florida.

At the time of the pelican's arrival, I was following the various weather reports concerning tropical storm Alberto. According to Rob Erhardt, Jr., a meteorologist with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Mobile, Alabama, Alberto formed off the western tip of Cuba on 30 June and appeared to start moving in a northwesterly direction. It was forecast to be near hurricane strength when it made landfall in North America. It arrived near Ft. Walton Beach, Florida, on 3 July with 65 mph winds. After landfall, the storm travelled north through the Florida panhandle, into Alabama, and then Georgia, dumping rain along the way.

Our visiting pelican seemed to be a "harbor" bird. During the ten or so days that I observed it, the pelican made its temporary home perch on top of a channel marker post just out from the west bank launching ramp. It showed little fear of me as I approached it with one of our patrol boats. It would merely watch me as I approached its perch to within about 20 feet and would then fly to a second channel marker post. Another incident that occurred that made me think of the pelican as a harbor bird was its behavior in accepting a free meal from a local fisherman. The fisherman told me that he observed the pelican perched atop the channel marker and decided to see if it would accept a handout. He cruised within about 50 feet of the bird and tossed a couple of

crappie into the water. The pelican flew from the post, made a slight circular flight, and plunged head first into the water for the fish.

The Brown Pelican was present atop the channel marker posts on the west side of the dam until about 10 July. This was truly a rare visit for one of Mississippi's endangered species.

KLEPTOPARASITISM OF AN AMERICAN ROBIN BY A RED-HEADED WOODPECKER

On 13 July 1994 at 11:30 under clear skies we observed an adult male American Robin (*Turdus migratorius*) as it pulled an earthworm from the ground in closely mowed grass on the Mississippi State University campus in Oktibbeha County. Just as the worm was pulled free of the ground, an adult Red-headed Woodpecker (*Melanerpes erythrocephalus*) flew to the ground to the right of the robin, seized the worm from it, and flew to the top of a utility pole with it, whereupon it swallowed its prize. The robin offered no resistance and continued its foraging; the woodpecker flew out of view. At 16:10 on the same date JAJ again saw a Red-headed Woodpecker steal an earthworm from an adult male robin at the same site.

The American Robin seems vulnerable to such thievery, known as kleptoparasitism, although this seems to be the first report of such kleptoparasitism by a Red-headed Woodpecker. It previously has been reported as the victim of House Sparrows (*Passer domesticus*; Arnold 1907, Pershing 1930), European Starlings (*Sturnus vulgaris*), Brown Thrashers (*Toxostoma rufum*), and gulls (Eiserer 1976).

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SHARP-SHINNED HAWK FEEDS THROUGH A CHAIN LINK FENCE

At approximately 07:45 on 12 March 1994, AJM, while driving past the U.S. Army's Waterways Experiment Station in Vicksburg, Warren County, Mississippi, noticed flapping at the bottom of a chain link fence. Upon stopping he observed a Sharp-shinned Hawk (*Accipiter striatus*) struggling with a still living Brown Thrasher (*Toxostoma rufum*). Both birds were on the ground and the hawk gripped the thrasher with talons on both feet, but the birds were on opposite sides of the chain link fence. The grass on both sides of the fence was mowed close. The hawk repeatedly tried to fly off with the thrasher, but the thrasher's size and struggling prevented the hawk from pulling it through the fence. Soon the thrasher stopped moving and the hawk was able to pull it through the fence and fly off with it.

Before pulling the thrasher through the fence, the hawk did not appear to eat a substantial portion of it, so its size was not much reduced. Instead, the limp body of the dead thrasher made it easier to pull through the fence.

In 1988, CN observed similar behavior by Sharp-shinned Hawks in Florida. He was holding Brown-headed Cowbirds (*Molothrus ater*) and Red-winged Blackbirds (*Agelaius phoeniceus*) in an outdoor aviary for experimental purposes. On several occasions Sharp-shinned Hawks killed and ate cowbirds and blackbirds through the one inch mesh of the aviary fence. In these cases the hawks ate their prey in place and were often so intent that several Sharp-shinned Hawks were captured using a hand net.

In the Florida cases the prey were killed through the fence. In Vicksburg, we do not know if the Brown Thrasher was initially attacked through the fence or if it moved through the fence after being attacked.

Birds are the principal prey of Sharp-shinned Hawks and persistent pursuit of prey is a characteristic behavior of the hawk. Bent (1938) describes one Sharp-shinned Hawk that reached under the bottom rail of a fence to pull out a chicken and another that went through the rusty wire of a pheasant pen while chasing a sparrow.

Other abbreviations used include the following: ad = adult; Co. = County; Cos. = Counties; f = female/s; Hwy./Hwys. = Highway/s; imm = immature/s; Is. = Island/s; juv = juvenile; m = male/s; max. = maximum; mi = mile/s; m.ob. = many observers; MSU = Mississippi State University; NMP = National Military Park; NWR = National Wildlife Refuge; pl = plumage; pr = pair/s; PRM = Pascagoula River Marsh; Ref. = Refuge; Rd. = Road; S.L. = Sewage Lagoon; S.P. = State Park; sp. = species; subad = subadult; WMA = Wildlife Management Area. The list of sightings is followed by a key to observers' initials and a gazetteer of localities.

Contributions of records are welcome from anyone who makes observations of Mississippi birds. Only with the assistance of many individuals from throughout the state over a period of years can we come to understand the dynamics of the bird populations of Mississippi. Contributors should submit records on 3" x 5" cards or similar-sized slips of paper with one record per card including the following information: species, number seen, date (including year), location (state, county and specific location), observer(s), and details and significance of observation. Very unusual records should be accompanied by full details including description of bird, details of observation, and explanation of how similar species were eliminated. While records are welcome at any time, those received by 15 March, 15 June, 15 August, and 15 December will

be submitted with the seasonal report to American Birds as well as being considered for use in The Mississippi Kite. Please send all records to:
