# 2017 MOS Spring Meeting to be held April 21-23 in Jackson!

This meeting will include speakers on both Friday and Saturday evenings. The Friday night meeting will be held at the Museum (2148 Riverside Drive, Jackson, MS 39202). A meet and greet with refreshments for MOS members will be followed by a public talk, "Decoding Bird Sounds" by Nathan Pieplow, and a book signing for his newly released *Peterson Guide to Bird Sounds*. Field trips on Saturday will go to Lefleur's Bluff State Park, Ross Barnett Reservoir area (including Pipeline Road and Fannye Cook Natural Area), and likely one trip to the south Delta for shorebirds if there is shorebird habitat close by at the time of the meeting. The Saturday evening banquet will be held at the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science with a talk by special guest Dr. Stephen Dinsmore presenting on his long-term work on the life history of the Mountain Plover.

**Stephen J. Dinsmore** is a Professor of wildlife ecology and Associate Chair in the Department of Natural Resource Ecology and Management at lowa State University. He received a B.S. in Fisheries and Wildlife Biology from Iowa State University (1990), a M.S. in Zoology (minor in Statistics) from North Carolina State University (1994), and a Ph.D. in Fishery and Wildlife Biology from Colorado State University (2001). Prior to his move to Iowa State, he was an Assistant Professor in the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries at

Mississippi State University. His primary interests are avian ecology, population biology, capture-recapture analysis, and monitoring animal populations. His research program at Iowa State University emphasizes studies of avian population biology. He currently supervises one research associate and four graduate students working primarily on issues of demography and habitat management of birds. In addition to projects involving graduate students, he maintains his own research program with Mountain Plovers and collaborates with scientists on projects related to avian ecology, population biology, and sampling and study design issues. His teaching responsibilities include an undergraduate course in ornithology, a graduate course in avian ecology, and study abroad courses to Antarctica and Costa Rica. He gives seminars and scientific presentations nationwide, and enjoys teaching workshops on the use of Program MARK and the analysis of wildlife demographic data. In his spare time, he enjoys spending time with his wife (Karen) and daughter (Lena), bird-watching, and traveling.



Nathan Pieplow lives in Boulder, Colorado, where he teaches writing and rhetoric at the University of Colorado.

An avid bird sound recordist, he is the author of the bird sound blog *Earbirding.com* and the author of the *Peterson Field Guide to Bird Sounds*. He is author of the *Colorado Birding Trail*, former board member of the Colorado Field Ornithologists and former editor of the *Journal of Colorado Birds*.

# **BIRDS TO WATCH FOR:** Northern Wheatear

There are established populations of this species in both the northwestern and northeastern portions of arctic North America but relatively few records southward in the continent since the Alaskan/Yukon birds first migrate eastward into Siberia and the east Canadian birds westward across Greenland to western Europe before both head south to separate wintering grounds in northern Africa. (An excellent account of this fascinating behavior can be found online at *All About Birds*, a website of the Cornell laboratory of Ornithology.)

Though there are no records for Mississippi as of yet, wheatears have been found in all the other Gulf Coast states at least once. Most U.S. reports are from fall through early winter.

It is a uniquely patterned, reasonably confiding, open-country species. If one happens to show up where you are, neither detection nor ID should be a problem.

They seem to prefer quiet shorelines, treeless, rubble-strewn fields and sparsely vegetated flats. Certainly dry lake beds, coastal salt-pans and quiet beaches and maybe sod farms and close-cropped fields, suggest themselves as high potential locales.

However, some years ago, one was found on a food plant lawn in New Orleans and the first one I ever saw, way back in the early 1950s, turned up in a tiny vacant lot in the heart of Archie Bunker Land (Queens, NY). It was reported (several times) by a 10-year old boy who was ignored for over a week by the birding establishment until someone finally decided to take a look.

So anything is possible. -NB





# SOME SIGHTINGS FROM THE FIELD (Fall/Winter 2016-17)

he state's fourth Audubon's Shearwater was a carcass found and photographed on Deer Island, Harrison County on 3 August. Just north of Deer Island at the Biloxi Small Craft Harbor an adult Great Black-backed
Gull was present on 11 August. Neotropic Cormorant is a rare but regular species in the Mississippi Delta but the five to eight seen 14-16 August was a first for Coldwater River NWR in Tallahatchie and Quitman Counties. On 19 August two Roseate Spoonbills were a rare find for Lower Sardis Lake, Panola County. A very early first summer plumaged Franklin's Gull was photographed on 26 August in Jackson County. A single A. Bittern was early in Humphreys County on 28 August. Grand Bay NERR, in Jackson County, hosted a juvenile Sooty Tern on 6 September. Also in Jackson County on 6 September a Yellow-headed Blackbird showed up at a feeder in Pascagoula A Red-necked Phalarone was



**Blackbird** showed up at a feeder in Pascagoula. A **Red-necked Phalarope** was a good find on 23 September in Oktibbeha County. A female **Brown Booby** was present for two weeks in early October at Lake Chewalla in Marshall County, the second sighting in as many



years in north Mississippi. On 4-6 October a **Say's Phoebe** was present near the concession stand on West Ship Island, Harrison County. The rare and seldom seen **Groove-billed Ani** was spotted on 18 October in east Pascagoula, Jackson County. A **Buff-bellied Hummingbird** put in an appearance in a hummer garden in Pascagoula on 1 November. Again in Jackson County at the Pascagoula River Audubon Center an adult male **Western Tanager** was photographed on 2 November. As many as eight and possibly 11 **Western Kingbirds** were reported from all three Gulf Coast counties through the period. This is unprecedented with as many as four **WEKI's** at the same locale in Jackson County. 26 **Black Scoters** were a great find on 6 November at Bay Springs Lake in Tishomingo County. The following week at Bay Springs Lake a **Pacific Loon** was spotted. **Rufous Hummingbirds** are regular migrants in central and southern Mississippi in the fall so a female was an excellent feeder bird for Lafayette County in late November-early December. The state's second **Couch's Kingbird** was photographed and the calls were recorded in late

November and remained on site until 3 January 2017 in Leflore County. The Sardis Lower Lake adult Lesser Black-backed Gull returned again for the fifth winter on 5 December and was still present on 2 Mar 2017. For the last three out of four winters the Sprague's Pipit on

Holly Grove Road, Panola County, was present from 9 December into late January 2017. Swan species are accidental on the Mississippi Gulf Coast so a Tundra Swan photographed on a Harrison County beach was a great find on 9 December. The Sidon CBC produced the state's third Brant record where six were found among thousands of snow geese in Leflore County on 17 December. A male Shiny Cowbird put in an appearance at a feeder 17-20 December in Hancock County. A first cycle California Gull, accidental in Mississippi, was present at the spillway on Enid Lake, Yalobusha County, from 21 December 2016 until 7 January 2017. Laughing Gulls seen away from the Mississippi Gulf Coast are rare so an adult found on the Grenada CBC on 28 December was a good find. Probably the same Tropical Kingbird, the state's first, returned to the same locale for a third winter in Hancock County on 31 December 2016 and was seen well into March 2017. With the eastern Golden Eagle declining a sub-adult photographed on 31 December near Crenshaw, Panola County, was a great find. A Nelson's Sparrow, accidental away from the Gulf Coast, was an excellent find in Noxubee County east of Macon 8-15 January. Another repeat site for Sprague's Pipit is Buck Island, Tunica County, and one was present on 31 January. Three Yellow Rails were flushed during a nocturnal rope drag survey on 4 February at Devil's Swamp, Hancock County. - GK



# Minutes of the MOS Board Meeting and Business Meeting September 30 - October 2, 2016

#### BOARD MEETING -

The Board of the Mississippi Ornithological Society met in the Starkville, Mississippi, Holiday Inn Express meeting room at 4:00 p.m. on September 30, 2016. Present were Chris King, Vice President; Wayne Patterson, Treasurer; Nick Winstead, Editor, *Mississippi Kite*; JR Rigby, Web Committee Chairman; and Martha Swan, Secretary.

Chris presided since the President could not attend. JR moved to approve the minutes of the Spring 2016 meeting as printed in the newsletter, and Chris seconded. The motion passed. Nick reported on the publication status of the *Mississippi Kite*. At present, it is six issues behind, and will be seven behind in December. He has material for three issues which are close to being ready, but the rest are "BATS" (Birds around the State) issues which require a huge amount of time to compile. Various people are working on different years. Beginning in 2017, web reporting will be available and will make publication easier. The aim is to catch up on *Kite* publication by this time next year.

JR reported on changes in the website. He plans to include a blog which will be archived. The board approved his request for new software to enhance and simplify maintenance. Later, he reported that the website needs a way to accept photos. Plans for the Spring 2017 meeting were discussed. Possible speakers suggested included Brian K. Wheeler, Scott Weidensaul, Michael O'Brien, Dan Lane, and Nick Lund, with Jackson, the Delta, and Tunica/Southaven area mentioned as locations. Fall 2017 could be on the Coast.

Wayne presented the Treasurer's Report indicating that MOS is in relatively good shape financially, after the successful Spring meeting. JR raised the issue of the Coffey Endowment. It was designated for helping with MOS publications, but now most publishing is online, so MOS has about \$18,000 in CDs sitting in the bank not being used, and not earning much interest. He suggested using some of it for student research grants, with the requirement that the recipient produce an article for the *Kite*. We need to check on the legal restrictions on these funds. This brought up the issue of the Yellow Rail research project, which MOS helped fund but never received the promised article. JR suggested that MOS needs some logo items to sell (T-shirts, mugs, etc.). Nick will supply him with the official MOS Mississippi Kite logo, for which MOS has all rights. Other ways of creating interest in MOS were suggested.

Matters which need to be brought up for voting at the Membership meeting are changes in the Constitution and By-laws, approval of the financial report, and election of officers.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 pm.

#### - MEMBERSHIP MEETING -

MOS members gathered at Harvey's Restaurant in Starkville at 6:30 p.m. for a banquet and the Annual Meeting. Ken Hackman, President, called the meeting to order. He thanked Marion Schiefer and members of the Oktibbeha Audubon Society for organizing the meeting. Wayne Patterson presented the Treasurer's Report. Nancy Madden moved acceptance and Bob Foehring seconded. The motion passed. Proposed changes to the Constitution and By-laws had been published in the newsletter. JR moved that the changes be



accepted and Nancy Madden seconded. The motion passed. Jason Hoeksema, chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the slate of officer nominations: JR Rigby, President; Hal Mitchell, Vice President; Holly Cox, Secretary; other officers remaining in their positions. Marion Schiefer moved to accept and Nancy Madden seconded, and the motion passed. Ken thanked the outgoing officers.

Ken conducted the species tally, and then dinner was served. Following the meal, Jason Hoeksema, President of Delta Wind Birds, held a raffle as a fundraiser for the organization, which seeks to improve habitat for migrating shorebirds. Jeff Harris then introduced the speaker, Dr. Scott Rush, an assistant professor in the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries & Aquaculture at Mississippi State University and a specialist in Wildlife Ecology and Management. His speech, "Recent Avian Research in Mississippi and Beyond," described research involving species as varied as Golden Eagles, Double-crested Cormorants, and Eastern Bluebirds. Following the program, Marion announced plans for Sunday field trip. The meeting was adjourned at 9:40 p.m.
