Noah Strycker, 31, is Associate Editor of Birding magazine, the author of two well-regarded books about birds, and a regular contributor of photography and articles to all major bird magazines as well as other media; he blogs regularly for the American Birding Association. Strycker set a world Big Year record in 2015, and his book about the experience, Birding Without Borders, will be released in Oct 2017. Strycker has studied birds on six continents with field seasons in Panama, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Hawaii, Maine, Michigan, Australia, Antarctica, the Galapagos Islands, and the Farallon Islands. He also works as a naturalist guide on expedition cruises to Antarctica and Norway's Svalbard archipelago. His first book, Among Penguins, chronicles a field season working with Adélie Penguins in Antarctica (Oregon State University Press, 2011) and his second, The Thing with Feathers, celebrates the fascinating behaviors of birds and human parallels (Riverhead Books, 2014). The President's Corner By JR Rigby MOS President

I was very fortunate this summer to accompany a group of college students to southeastern Arizona and do some birding in the Chiricahua Mountains. In many ways it was like birding for the first time all over again: new sounds, new landscapes, and so many hummingbirds! The feeling of exploring a totally new landscape is unique and wonderful and utterly disorienting. I established a couple of "patches" nearby that I checked many times during my stay, and soon the foreign landscape became more familiar.

Honestly, though, I was surprised how quickly familiarity began to set in. It was, of course, a superficial familiarity based entirely on a level of comfort with the identification of common species in the area by sight and sound. It was not the more intimate familiarity with the habits, variability, seasonal rhythms and particularities I have established with some of the species I watch most in Mississippi. Without much self-awareness, I went on walks and tallied Acorn Woodpeckers and other common (for that place) birds mostly without a second thought.

Near the end of our stay, the students in our group were required to come up with questions about organisms in the area that they could reasonably address with a single day of observation and investigation. They were given a day to make their observations and then asked to prepare a presentation to the group sharing their findings. To give only one example of many, a student followed Acorn Woodpeckers around the research station where we lodged to find out how many acorn caches they used and which were favored. In her day of observation she found out many things about Acorn Woodpeckers besides this.

Though I probably tallied a hundred more encounters with these birds than this student had in our stay, one afternoon of observation with a specific question in mind had given this student far more understanding of Acorn Woodpeckers than I had. This was true of most of the presentations. The results of the students' work were humbling.

While I have become knowledgeable about some birds in my regular patches around Oxford through shear volume of birding and curiosity, I have clearly only scratched the surface. It's a new birding resolution of mine to do more question-driven birding, and I think it will add a new dimension to long-familiar landscapes. I invite you to do the same. Spend some time writing down some questions. And stick to small questions that can be addressed in a day or a weekend of intentional observation. I think the results might surprise you.

Minutes of the MOS Spring Board Meeting and Business Meeting April 21 & 22, 2017

BOARD MEETING -

The Board of Directors of the Mississippi Ornithology Society met at 3:32 p.m. on Friday, April 21, 2017 at the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science in Jackson. Present were J.R. Rigby, President; Hal Mitchell, Vice President; Wayne Patterson, Treasurer; Ken Hackman, Past President; Nick Winstead, Editor of the Mississippi Kite; Gene Knight, MBRC Editor of the MOS Newsletter; and Holly Cox, Secretary.

J.R. moved that the minutes of the Fall 2016 meeting as printed in the newsletter be approved and it was unanimously approved. Wayne passed out the Treasurer's report showing a balance through April 2017 of \$29,246.79, which includes the bank and Paypal combined total of \$7,558.88, Savings Account of \$3,079.45 and the Coffey Endowment CDs of \$18,608.46. J.R. explained that MOS's previous Employer ID was lost by the State and he is working with attorneys to get a new EIN and complete registration for MOS to have 501(c)(3) status by Fall 2017. J.R. asked Wayne whether the MOS Bank accounts had co-signors on the CDs like the checking account does. Wayne stated that Ken Hackman, previous President, is still listed co-signer on the CDs. J.R. and Wayne agreed to get together and sign the necessary Bank papers to transition the account for Wayne and J.R., as current President, to be co-signers. Wayne stated the CDs are located at a Coast bank as set up by a previous Treasurer. Wayne will move the account from the Coast by Fall 2017, if not sooner.

Nick brought out old MOS Treasurer's documents which had been kept at MMNS for Wayne to look through. The documents included old checking account papers and processed checks from the 60's and 70's. Wayne went through them keeping only the original MOS EIN paper and anything else he felt important. Ken moved to get rid of the old bank statements and checks and Wayne seconded the motion. Nick asked Wayne whether he wanted to keep the current MOS Treasurer's papers at MMNS. Wayne stated that since he only had records for the past 2 years, he would keep them for now and that he might move them to MMNS in the future. It was mentioned that the previous treasurer Jan Dubuisson's records and reports had never been given to MOS. Nick thought he recalled since she lived on the Coast she had lost them in Hurricane Katrina. A brief discussion was held about ways to assist members with annual dues notification. It was noted that members were using Paypal on the website to pay dues.

Nick announced that all MOS publications were up-to-date. He made suggestions for future article ideas (field notes, weird sightings, rare sightings, 1st State records, etc.) and to solicit ideas from Mississippi birders within MOS and through MISSBird Listserv. Gene stated that the July BATS publication was good and he was working on a possible re-design for December 2017. Discussions were made to add more content, a new format, and to add photos to BATS. J.R. tabled making revisions and a new re-design for now while Nick takes time to consider the changes.

JR went over the final Spring 2017 business meeting details. Field trips were discussed and it was decided they would be the Yazoo Catfish ponds, Fannie Cook nature area, Pipeline Road, and LeFleur's Bluff. J.R. announced that the MOS Fall 2017 meeting would be held on the Coast, October 13-15, 2017 and that Noah Strycker will be the guest speaker. Suggestions were made for the Spring 2018 guest booking with possibly Brian K.

Wheeler somewhere in the North Delta area near or in Tunica County. (Email forwarded from J.R. to Board members after this meeting sent from Wheeler stating his book publication was delayed and that Fall 2018 might work better for everyone).

- J.R. gave an update on the status of the MOS website re-design and showed a sample webpage he has been working on. He is hoping to have the new site up and running by year's end.
- J.R. stated that he had been in contact with Ebird representatives regarding a contest to encourage birders to Ebird sightings in unbirded counties in Mississippi. Ebird was very receptive and said they would donate Zeiss binoculars for the winner. It was unanimously agreed to pursue this project next year.
- J.R. mentioned he contacted Sardis WMA regarding additional access to areas not open to the public for birding. Sardis WMA has agreed to open the closed areas every day in the Winter (Dec, Jan, Feb) for the normally inaccessible 3,000 acres. He is hoping that other Mississippi WMAs will to do the same.
- J.R. said he would like to have MOS T-shirts, caps, etc. available to sell by the Fall 2017 meeting. He will circulate new ideas via email in the months to come.
- J.R. announced that the J.W. Tucker Award was being presented to Ned Boyajian at the banquet business meeting this year.

Hal brought up the continued need of MOS working towards young birder recruits. Ideas discussed included advertising, sponsorships at Millsaps birding camp, day camps, Boyscouts, ABA sponsored camps, etc. Holly will pursue more options with the possibility of MOS sponsoring young birders or hosting our own birding day camps in the future. J.R. brought up the idea of purchasing NFC (Nocturnal Flight Call) devices similar to what Strawberry Plains is doing.

Gene made a motion to adjourn the meeting and it was seconded by Ken. The meeting ended at 4:52 p.m.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING -

MOS members met at the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science in Jackson, Mississippi for the Spring banquet at 6:45 p.m. J.R., President, called the meeting to order and thanked Nick Winstead and everyone at MMNS for hosting the meeting. Ken Hackman moved that the minutes of the Fall 2016 meeting be approved as printed in the newsletter, Nancy Madden seconded, and the motion was approved. J.R. discussed the history of the J.W. Tucker Award and acknowledged previous recipient members present which included Gene Knight and Mary Stribling, and also acknowledged Bob and Martha Sargent, not present. He introduced Jason Hoeksema who presented the 2017 J.W. Tucker Award to Ned Boyajian. Jason gave a bio of Ned's extensive birding background and a list of his great contributions to the State of Mississippi as well as throughout the United States. Ned graciously thanked everyone.

Gene Knight conducted the species tally. J.R. then gave an update on MOS activities stating that Nick and Gene had gotten the Kite publications completely updated. He mentioned that they were seeking additional articles for BATS and gave several ideas of what they were looking for. He then mentioned a contest idea attempting to bird more unbirded counties in Mississippi and that representatives at Ebird were onboard to contribute Zeiss binoculars to the winner. The contest will likely be held in 2018. He then gave an update on revising the MOS website which will hopefully be completed by the end of this year to include real-time BATS on line. He also announced that Sardis WMA agreed to open non-public areas of Mississippi WMA for birding during the winter and that he is contacting other Mississippi WMA's to try and obtain similar access. J.R. then introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Stephen J. Dinsmore, a Professor of wildlife ecology and Associate Chair in the Department of Natural Resource Ecology and Management at Iowa State University. He gave a presentation on "Plovers, Prairie Dogs and Plague" with an emphasis on the life history of the Mountain Plover. Following the presentation, J.R. asked members to "save the date" for the MOS Fall 2017 meeting which would be held on the Coast, October 13-15, 2017. Noah Strycker, author and previous birding world record holder in 2015, will be the guest speaker. He then announced that tomorrow's field trip would be decided at the hotel breakfast area and in his absence Jason Hoeksema would lead. The meeting adjourned at 7:13 p.m.

2017 Tucker Award recipient: Ned Boyajian

MOS periodically presents the J.W. Tucker Award to a person who has made significant lifetime contributions to ornithology in Mississippi. At the spring, 2017 MOS meeting in Jackson, the Tucker Award was presented to Ned Boyajian. Ned started birding at age 6 in New Jersey, where his first life bird was a Blue Jay in September of 1938. His first pair of binoculars came nine years later, when he remembers finding significant birding inspiration from his first sighting of a Bufflehead. Soon, Ned was among the most active birders in the New York City area. During the 1950's and 60's, he was an active member and leader of the Linnaean Society of New York, serving as President, Vice-president, and Recording Secretary (essentially records committee chair), and also served as a regional editor for Audubon Field Notes. In 1965, he co-authored the book "Familiar Garden Birds of America," with Henry Collins Jr., and was the American consultant to the "Pictorial Encyclopedia of Birds" by J. Hanzák (1967). Ned has lived and birded all over the USA, including California, Louisiana, and Arizona, but has lived part-time or full-time in Mississippi for many years now. Among his contributions to birding and ornithology in Mississippi are:

- Maintaining and updating an Annotated Checklist of the Six Coastal Counties
- Compiling the Southern Hancock Christmas Bird Count
- Member of the Mississippi Bird Records Committee
- eBird reviewer for Mississippi
- Prepared the original user ID guide for the Audubon Coastal Bird Survey, and continues to conduct two ACBS surveys and to help with others
- Wrote, or revised, all the site descriptions for the original Mississippi Coastal Birding Trail
- Reviewed, evaluated, and prepared for entry into eBird of some 20+ years of weekly Seaman Road surveys
- Wrote "the Birding Year" contribution to the book "Guide to Birding Coastal Mississippi"
- Participates in weekly bird surveys at the Seaman Road Sewage Lagoons

Some Sightings From The Field (Spring/Summer 2017) Gene Knight, MBRC Chair

White-winged Dove has nested in the state for years but the first photographic evidence was acquired in March 2017 from Pascagoula, Jackson County. (2 chicks were photographed with an adult). On 14 March an Ash-throated Flycatcher was present in Logtown, Hancock County. The Pacific Loon present this winter at Bay Springs Lake, Tishomingo County, was seen again in the company of a **Red-throated Loon** on 19 March. The **Neotropic Cormorant** continues to be seen away from the MS Delta. One at Hussey Sod Farm in Lee County on 25 March and one on Ross Barnett Reservoir, Madison County on 30 April were good finds. And two possible nests were seen on 22 April at the north end of Panther Swamp NWR in Yazoo County. A rare Gray Kingbird was photographed on 14 April off Belle Fontaine Drive, Jackson County. Black-whiskered Vireo is rarely seen in the state but one was reported from Singing River Island, Jackson County on 24 April. For the third straight spring a male Bronzed Cowbird was present at an inland feeder in Brookhaven, Lincoln County on 26 April and remained for a least a week. Also present at this feeder was a single Inca Dove on 2 May. Possibly the same female Brown Booby that has been seen at several lakes in north MS was found on 26 April in Marion County at Lake Bill Walker. It was later picked up on 29 April and taken to a rehab center and later died. A Cave Swallow was photographed on 30 April in Jackson County at Seaman Road Lagoons. The elusive Black-billed Cuckoo was reported from Marshall County on 2 May near Waterford and then on 10 May one heard east

of Oxford, Lafayette County. On 3 May a male Cape May Warbler posed for photographs near Oxford, Lafayette County. The first photographic documentation of Horned Lark on the MS Gulf Coast was present on 6 May at Seaman Road Lagoons. Only two previous records exist from coastal counties. Grasshopper Sparrows were present on Buck Island Road, Tunica County on 6 May and Hale Quarters Road in Monroe County on 20 May. On 7 May a pair of Western Kingbirds were present near Greenville along the MS River Levee at the Warfield Point Park sign. There are very few inland MS records of Whimbrel so one present at Oktibbeha County Lake on 12 May was a great find. Spring Red-necked Phalaropes are similarly rare in the state but a breeding plumage male was photographed on West Ship Island, Harrison County on 13 May. Also on 13 May a male Mourning Warbler was seen for several hours at Rowan Oak, Oxford, Lafayette County. A male Shiny Cowbird was present on 13-22 May at Ansley, Hancock County. Spring Mississippi Kites are not noted to be seen in large numbers but 150+ were reported just northwest of Oxford, Lafayette County on 25 May. Scissor-tailed Flycatchers have nested in the Sessums Community, Oktibbeha County in the past and this year wasn't any different as a pair was seen on 2 May and fledglings on 31 July. A single Scissor-tailed Flycatcher was spotted on 18 June along Hwy 305 in Tate County and a pair was present on 2 July at Black Swamp Mitigation Bank near Aberdeen, Monroe County. A 1st year Brown Booby was photographed flying south of Sand Island, Jackson County on 27 May. A remarkable sighting of a Tropical Kingbird in Pascagoula, Jackson County on 9 and 23 June was reported with photographs. On 16 June a single Western Kingbird was seen at the MS Extension Center south of Verona, Lee County. Tropical Storm Cindy produced several rare terns in June. An adult and immature Sooty Tern was present on 21 June at Moses Pier, Harrison County. The next day on 22 June an immature Sooty Tern was in Wiggins, Stone County. Also on 22 June a Bridled Tern was photographed at the old Broadwater Marina, Harrison County. On 25 June a dead Bridled Tern was found at the Pass Christian Harbor, Harrison County. Post breeding Swallow-tailed Kites were as far north as Camp McCain, Grenada County on 5 July (1 spotted) and 2 were seen on 18 July at Lefleur's Bluff SP, Hinds County. An unprecedented 2-3000 Neotropic Cormorants were present at St. Catherine Creek NWR, Adams County on 30 July and 11 August.
